We sincerely thank you for participating in the Heritage District Process for Assessing Church Potential which was conducted at the request of the District Superintendent. The facilitators of the assessment team met to discuss the strengths and challenges for Blissfield Emmanuel United Methodist Church.

God calls us to be faithful stewards of all the resources granted us. Struggling simply to keep a building in good repair with paid utilities does not allow you the necessary vitality to look out into the world and discover the ways that God is calling you to make disciples of Jesus Christ for the transformation of the world. As we worked with you to assess your church's potential, we all remind ourselves of God's call to make disciples of all nations (Mat 28:19) and to fulfill Christ's commandment to love God and our neighbor (Mat 22:34-40).

In offering the recommendations below, the district team has reviewed the information that you compiled and, prayerfully asked, as you did, the following questions:

- a. What is the potential for ministry in the community?
- b. Does the church currently have the resources (leadership and financial/facilities resources) to serve the community through ministries of nurture, outreach, and witness?
- c. Is the church currently able to fulfill its call to ministry and to optimize the stewardship of the ministry resources available?

In considering the information you collected and reviewed about your congregation, the team noted the following key factors in making its decision:

### **Strengths**

The church has a stable attendance and has paid 100% of their ministry shares. The leaders in the church have built upon this stability, by creating a strong youth ministry. The building is well-maintained and there is a deep love for the wider community as seen through the outreach programs.

### Challenges

However, Blissfield Emmanuel UMC is facing formidable challenges. While the building has been kept up some maintenance issues will need to be addressed. The building is in need of a new roof, the windows are in need of repair and the parking lot needs resurfacing. In addition, the church is not fully handicap accessible which is a hinderance for those who are not fully able-bodied. Finally, the mission and vision of the church is unclear especially when considering its relationship to the community.

As the team developed the following action steps, we kept in mind that the primary purpose of the local church is to be outwardly focused and missional. Here are the action steps you are being asked to pray about, discuss and decide over the in the next few months:

### Plan A

The Team highly recommends beginning a process based on the book: Church Unique: How Missional Leaders Cast Vision, Capture Culture and Create Movement.

This process will:

develop a clear vision and accompanying core values once completed align all ministries and outreach around this vision

Contact David Bell and Jeff Regan with the United Methodist Foundation to develop a stewardship program encompassing preaching and teaching on stewardship

Develop a long-term strategy for the building and its growing maintenance needs.



Plan B

Build a relationship with Blissfield First UMC forming joint bible studies, VBS, missions, outreach and worship programs. The long-term viability of both congregations might depend on the two congregations working closely together through shared ministries. This may lead to a merged congregation in the future.

We ask that you prayerfully discern God's will in this important matter.


Let the District Superintendent know which recommendation you would like to pursue by October 15, 2019. We will then schedule a church conference to consider the matter. Your pastor and the Vitality Assessment Team are available to assist you as you decide. If you decide to go ahead with these recommendations, a coach will be assigned to your church who will assist you through the process.
